



STG2 - Sonar Technician 2nd Class

- Identify sounds produced by surface ships, torpedoes, submarines, evasion devices, sonar transmissions, marine life and natural phenomena;
- Operate sonar sensors for detection and classification of contacts;
- Identify the characteristics, functions and effects of controlled jamming and evasive devices on sonar operations;
- Prepare and interpret sonar messages;
- Operate underwater fire control systems for firing of torpedoes;
- Recognize major equipment malfunctions during sensor operations;
- Operate bathythermographs, fathometers, and torpedo countermeasures;
- Use and maintain hand tools and portable power tools;
- Operate underwater communications equipment.

Perfect your 30 second sales pitch

*always be networking and ready to sell yourself

Allow me to introduce myself...

"Hi! My name is Malia. I'm a Navy veteran. I maintained computer and electrical equipment utilized in the search and classification of foreign submarines. I ensured all of our equipment was networked properly throughout the ship and safeguarded our secret materials. I also oversaw security awareness training for our 12-person division."

Practice, Practice, Practice!

Sanity Check

Practice with non-military friends. "Does this make sense?"

Update your pitch

Constantly adjust and update as you add more relevant experiences

Be confident!

Don't rush, calmly and boldly give your introduction! (try not to be *too* moto)

Allow me to (re)introduce myself...

"Hi! My name is Malia. I'm an experienced cybersecurity engineer. Currently, I am the the vulnerability manager for Hulu. I am also a small business owner and Navy Veteran. I recently co-founded the nonprofit, CyberDEI, and am Chair of the Technology Committee for AnitaBorg. I frequently volunteer my time by mentoring other veterans, women and girls in tech, as well as serve as an advisor for my local community college cyber programs."



*current boss lady status (and frequently adjusted)

Interview tips

*find a mentor, and practice often!

Practice Mock Interviews

Each bullet point on your resume should be a hook into a conversation - be prepared to explain or defend *everything* listed on your resume.

What to wear?

(for video interviews)

Women & female identifying

- Blouse, not too form fitting
- Avoid cleavage
- Button down is fine watch the gaps
- Hair up or down, make sure it's neat
- Be aware of hair or earrings hitting your mic
- Wear make up, or not, go easy on it be subtle, not flashy
- Clean nails polish on or off
- Wear a bottom just in case!

Men & male identifying

- Button down shirt or polo
- Neat hair, neat facial hair
- Wear pants!
- Trim and clean your nails

How to sit? (for video interviews)

Don't slouch

- Be comfortable, but don't lean
- Shoulders straight, but not tight
- Place your elbows on the table at 90 degree angle from your body

Look at the interviewer

- Line up your webcam with your eyes
- Look into the camera, not your video

Be still

- Don't kick your legs or swivel in your chair
- Place your feet flat on the ground you'll force a better posture

How to act? (for video interviews)

It's not an inspection

- Drop the sirs and ma'ams
- Relax and stay calm

Remember to be human

- Unclench your jaw and smile
- Nod your head at times
- Stay focused, but no 10,000 yard stares

Relax

- Tell a joke, lighten the mood
- It's ok to gesture with your hands but no knife hands!
- It's ok to be nervous and to say so!
- It's ok to say "I don't know"

Merely Suggestions

Everyone is different.

These are merely suggestions.

Practice mock interviews!

Deep breaths.

Drink water.

Have a clean and quiet room.



Common military experiences

*every veteran has something to offer the tech world

Morning Musters

You are familiar with schedules and timelines and you stick to them.

"If you're not early, you're late!"

Sweepers, sweepers, man your brooms

You recognize the value in a clean and tidy workplace, especially when it comes to electrical equipment.

Maintaining a clean work environment is also related to organization skills, which can relate to project management.

Standing Watch

You stuck to a schedule and showed up for duty on time. You did a proper pass down and relieved your watch stander.

Documentation and training. You know what is needed to properly do a job, so you ensure that people are properly briefed and have the tools needed to do the job.

So. Much. Training.

You crammed for your job in a limited amount of time and were placed in charge at your next duty station.

You can learn a lot and can learn it fast. You can absorb material faster than civilians and are used to constant training. You are eager to learn.

Chain of command

You know and respect the chain of command and understand there are proper reporting procedures.

You know first to go to your team lead, then supervisor, then director, etc. You know not to email the CTO with every little issue.

Division / command leader

You know how to get stuff done thoroughly and efficiently.

You are a project manager. You were assigned to complete a task in a given time and are expected to complete it. You know how to direct your people to get it done and how to organize them.
